

There was an increase in active calls and clinical case management referrals across almost all regions covered by the Boulder County Co-Responder Program. The biggest increases were in Lyons, Superior, and Lafayette.

Meditation by ART: Zentangle

Steps:

1. Get comfortable, take a deep breath.
2. Place your pen above your piece of paper and imagine a string is on the end and as your pen gets closer to the paper imagine the string laying on the paper and draw how the string fell onto the paper with the pen. This is your "string."
3. From the string you begin to draw a pattern or tangles. Don't worry what it is going to look like, just focus on the strokes of the pen. There is not up or down, just draw and design.
